1:00	QUESTION – How can one get a bell/chime like sound on the harp?
1:40	DEMO – Horn 5ths from last week's chat.
2:40	DEMO – Ways to get a chime-like sound experimenting with 3rds or 6ths, plus other
20	possibilities. Use fewer notes to get more of the chime sound.
6:15	Explains how this demo relates to upcoming class: Strings of Passion. Start with impulse to create a chime sound and then go through process of experimentation to do so.
7:00	DEMO - More experimenting on getting a chime-like sound. One can use various harp techniques like a harmonic or pdlt to use to create the sound.

13:45	Vera comes on camera to demo her idea of bell sound, which is to play 2 octaves apart. DHC

22:30	Has class play along to get feel of slowing down or pausing to get from one type of rhythm to next. Need to take listener with you on various changes.
31:00	DEMO – How music is expressed on many different levels. A simple gesture can connect
	emotionally, then you can add other ideas to it.
35:00	Class takeaways
36:00	QUESTION – "Here is a comment by my husband (a non musician) about my playing: "Well, that thing you put in the middle doesn't even sound like the song!!!!!". Is this just him, or should I be playing the improv with the same rhythm and make it sound sort of like the song?"
37:15	There are many ways to explore a melody.
38:30	DEMO - Exploration of "We Wish You a Merry Christmas." Asks class to explain what she's doing. Can explore on chord progression, but in this case DHC used 1,6,2,5 and kept the rhythmic feel of the tune.
41:30	Has class play along on the 1,6,2,5 progression.
43:30	DHC sometimes teaches that one can also do something away, especially to make it easier for the performer.
44:15	DEMO - Exploring by using a different technique on the tune or putting tune in minor key.
43:15	DEMO – Exploring by embellishing the tune or adding ornament to it.
47:14	DEMO – Exploring by re-harmonizing the tune.
50:15	DEMO – Play the chord progession down a third below the normal chord (relative minor)
53:00	Two upcoming classes are about telling story with music and singing while playing.
